





Old Brains, New Staff, New Dreams: My First 60 days with RPM

Jon Carlos* looked uncomfortable and uncertain standing in our foyer area waiting for someone to help him. We had just finished our morning round of English and Spanish classes with the usual flurry of activity. People were

hurrying to leave, others lingering with questions, some just hanging around to chat because they enjoy being here. As soon as we were free, Jacky (RPM's Director of Operations) and I greeted him in Spanish and asked how we could help. He said he was new to the area and wanted to take English classes. He brought his bike into the foyer, and we sat down to talk about our programs.

We found out Jon Carlos was a medical student from Cuba and had only been in the States for three weeks. He wanted to learn English so he could continue his medical studies here in the USA. My ten years of adjunct teaching in Cuba allowed me to quickly connect with him, since I know first-hand the challenges of living in this island nation. For now, he is living with his brother who took English classes here at RPM several years ago. His brother told him to come see us.

Jon Carlos is the reason we are ministering in this neighborhood. Each month we serve hundreds of people like him who need our help. They aren't looking for handouts, they need education and resources so they can improve their lives and those of their children.

80% of the people we serve speak Spanish as their first language and many struggle to communicate fluently in English. Over half the people in our neighborhood live below the poverty level and many of those are unemployed. The ESL and computer classes we offer are key to their escape from poverty.

Want to Hold a Brain?

In my first 60 days as RPM's new Executive Director, I've taught classes for students learning English as a second language, taught adults learning Spanish as a second language, and helped students in our bi-lingual computer skills classes.

I've sat in on our workshops on trauma, grief, and loss, and assisted in an English class for Spanish speakers on medical terminology and brain health.

Our guest lecturer was Dr. Irving Vega, a professor of Translational Neuroscience from Michigan State University. He brought in a couple of human brains and let us handle them. Human brains are firm and squishy all at the same time (in case you wondered).
